## The People of Hadīth Were Propagators and Defenders of the Creed and Methodology of Ahl Al-Sunnah Al-ʿAllāmah Rabīʿ al-Madkhalī

Then others came who carried this banner after them: al-Bukhārī, Abū Hātim, Abū Zur'ah, Imām Muslim, Abū Dāwūd, al-Tirmidhī, al-Nasā'ī, Ibn Mājah, and those Imāms of Islām who lived in their era. All of these Imāms were *Ahl al-Sunnah wa al-Jamā'ah* in *Da'wah*, recording the *Sunnah*, and refuting the misguided sects as will come. Then their students followed them such as Ibn Khuzaymah and those who lived in his era, and 'Uthmān Ibn Sa'īd al-Dārimī and their likes; they carried the banner of the *Sunnah*, protected it and defended it ()). Then after them al-Dāruqutnī came and those who lived in his era, then after them came al-Khaṭīb and those who lived in his era. Then after them came 'Abd al-Ghanī al-Maqdisī, Ibn Qudāmah, and Diyā' al-Maqdisī. Then after them came Ibn Taymīyah and his students and peers such as al-Mizzī, Ibn al-Qayyim, al-Dhahabī, Ibn Kathīr and Ibn Rajab. Then there was an interval of time that elapsed, then came the true *Mujadid* (reviver) who revived Islām in respects of religion and establishing a state, Imām Muḥammad Ibn 'Abd al-Wahhāb may Allāh be pleased with him and may Allāh reward him and his students with good and those who traversed his way.

These individuals O brothers in short and in summary are the *Firqah al-Nājiyah* (Saved Sect), the  $T\bar{a}'ifah$  al-Manṣūrah (the Aided Group), Ahl al-Ḥadīth and the Ghurabā' (the Strangers). Say what you wish regarding them from the praise and tribute they deserve, and what the Book of Allāh proves. And their chiefs in this arena are the companions of the Messenger of Allāh ( $\overline{u}$ )...<sup>n</sup>
